

Prohibited Street Tree Species

Ordinance 35-1997 regulates the type of street trees that may be planted within the Village of Holland. The following trees shall not be planted on public right of way without the specific consent of the Village Tree Commission. Right of way means any portion of the public way, street, alley or sidewalk. Generally the right of way is that area between the roadway and sidewalk (if present). Streets without sidewalks will have the right of way designated by the location of utility poles.

If more than one tree is to be planted in the right of way, the ordinance states specific spacing requirements:

Small Trees – may not be planted closer together than 30 feet and no closer than a distance of two feet from the curb or sidewalk

Medium Trees-may not be planted closer together than 40 feet and no closer than a distance of three feet from the curb or sidewalk

Large Trees-may not be planted closer together than 50 feet and no closer than a distance of four feet from the curb or sidewalk

No right of way tree other than those referred to as Small Trees shall be planted under or within 25 lateral feet of any overhead utility wire. No tree, regardless of size, may be planted closer than 35 feet from any street intersection measured from the intersecting curb lines or any closer than 10 feet to any fire hydrant.
